

On global best practice for 2 - 5 year olds

Learning Principles

The International Early Years Curriculum (IEYC) is a research-based curriculum recognising global best practice in early childhood education and the developmental needs of 2-5 year olds. It supports key areas of learning through holistic enquiry and play-based approaches that cover all curriculum areas including personal, social and emotional development.

The IEYC was developed based on eight learning principles:



The earliest years of life are important in their own right



Children should be supported to learn and develop at their own unique pace



Play is an essential aspect of all children's learning and development



Learning happens when developmentallyappropriate teacherscaffolded and childinitiated experiences harness children's natural curiosity in an enabling environment



Independent and interdependent learning experiences create a context for personal development and are the foundation of international mindedness



Knowledge and skills development lead to an increasing sense of understanding when children are provided with opportunities to explore and express their ideas in multiple




Ongoing assessment, in the form of evaluation and reflection, is effective when it involves a learning-link with the home



Learning should be motivating, engaging and fun, opening up a world of wonder for children where personal interests can flourish

Process of Learning

We focus on a process of learning rather than relying solely on learning outcomes to drive a child's development. Our IEYC process of learning captures children's natural curiosity as a starting point and balances child-initiated and teacher-scaffolded provision within an enabling environment.



Capturing Curiosity

Our unique process of learning shifts the focus from measuring outcomes to driving children's learning and development. The IEYC is designed to be flexible and work alongside existing national curriculum while offering the structure required to suit all practitioners.

The Entry Point launches each new IEYC unit and is planned to enable children to explore new experiences in a way that sparks interest and curiosity, prompting recall of previous learning and generating excitement for the new learning to come.


Capturing Curiosity allows learners to share what they are curious to learn and the unit is adapted to enhance these opportunities.

Enable the Environment develops relevant indoor and outdoor learning spaces to create the positive climate for enquiry and learning to take place.

The Big Picture provides learners with an overview of each unit of learning and prepares them for a new learning experience.

Explore and Express provides children with opportunities to engage in activities that have been holistically designed around the Learning Strands.

The Exit Point ends every IEYC unit. It brings learners together to reflect, share and celebrate what they have learnt together and with, at times, the community.






focuses on developing a broad range of communication skills including language development, early literacy, early mathematics, ICT and computing, expressive arts and creativity.

Learning Strand 3 - Enquiring: This strand focuses on developing the skills of enquiry through exploring people and the world. It will support children in understanding the similarities and differences in people, living things, the environment and materials. Children will be encouraged to investigate, pose questions and explore ideas.

Learning Strand 4 - Healthy Living and Physical

Well-Being: This strand focuses on developing a positive attitude to health, self-care and physical activity. They will learn how to take care of basic hygiene and personal needs and how to keep themselves safe.
